RESCUE RADIO: FEMA AND ARRL
ANNOUNCE NEW COOPERATIVE
AGREEMENT

The ARRL and the Federal Emergency Management Agency have announced a new Memorandum of Agreement. One that is destined to enhance cooperation between the League and FEMA in the area of disaster communication.

Bill Pasternak, WA6ITF, is in the Newsroom with the details: Calling radio is one of the most resilient communications technologies we have, FEMA Administrator Craig Fugate, KK4INZ, penned his name to a Memorandum of Agreement with the American Radio Relay League (ARRL). This to further mutual cooperation in times of disaster and preparing for such emergencies.

The new agreement will allow FEMA and the ARRL to work together to provide resources, services and personnel to fortify the relief agency's capacity in certain areas. These include emergency communications, disaster preparedness along with response and recovery assistance. It will also task the two with jointly raising public awareness about the use of Amateur Radio as a public safety resource.

The agreement also outlines the ways in which the two organizations will cooperate to carry out their individual responsibilities with respect to disaster mitigation, preparedness, and response and recovery operations. This, in the event of a natural or man-made disaster.

The signing ceremony took place on July 18th at the ARRL's Centenary Convention in Hartford, Connecticut, with League President Kay Craigie, N3KN, signing the document for the League. This agreement takes the United States Amateur Radio service yet another step forward in becoming a vital communications resource when disaster strikes and especially in those instances when all other means of communications fail.

And to quote FEMA Administrator Fugate: Amateur Radio is taking that hobby and turning it into saving lives.

SKYWARN

defined in the Weather Spotter's Field Guide as a National Weather Service (NWS) program developed in the 1960s that consists of trained weather spotters who provide reports of severe and hazardous

weather to help meteorologists make life-saving warning decisions. Riverside County SKYWARN is a program of the San Diego NWS office and serves western Riverside County and the Coachella Valley.

SKYWARN spotters act as the NWS eyes and ears in the field. Their reports provide vital "ground truth" to the NWS. They also help meteorologists issue timely, accurate, and detailed warnings by confirming hazardous weather detected by NWS radar. Spotters provide critical verification information that helps improve future warning services. Without them, NWS would be less able to fulfill its mission of protecting life and property.

Riverside County SKYWARN is activated by the NWS when needed during severe weather events to provide weather observations from affected areas. Amateur radio plays an important role in the communications process by allowing trained spotters to report hazardous situations to a net controller who is continually in touch with the San Diego NWS office during activations.

Weekly Riverside County SKYWARN roll call nets are held on Tuesdays at 7:00 p.m. on the N6MRN Pine Cove Repeater (447.480- 156.7). All amateur radio operators are welcome and invited to check in on the nets. Severe weather conditions in the Riverside County Mountains are frequently the cause of SKYWARN activations. MHRC members can benefit by having the Pine Cove repeater programmed into their radios in

Buying a Watch in 1880



If you were in the market for a watch in 1880, would you know where to get one? You would go to a store, right? Well, of course you could do that, but if you wanted one that was cheaper and a bit better than most of the store

watches, you went to the train station! Sound a bit funny? Well, for about 500 towns across the northern United States, that's where the best watches were found.


Why were the best watches found at the train station? The railroad company wasn't selling the watches, not at all. The telegraph operator was. Most of the time the telegraph operator was located in the railroad station because the telegraph lines followed the railroad tracks from town to town. It was usually the shortest distance and the right-of-ways had already been secured for the rail line. Most of the station agents were also skilled telegraph operators and that was the primary way that they communicated with the railroad. They would know when trains left the previous station and when they were due at their next station. And it was the telegraph operator who had the watches. As a matter of fact, they sold more of them than almost all the stores combined for a period of about 9 years.

This was all arranged by "Richard", who was a telegraph operator himself. He was on duty in the North Redwood, Minnesota train station one day when a load of watches arrived from the East. It was a huge crate of pocket watches. No one ever came to claim them.

So Richard sent a telegram to the manufacturer and asked them what they wanted to do with the watches. The manufacturer didn't want to pay the freight back, so they wired Richard to see if he could sell them. So Richard did. He sent a wire to every agent in the system asking them if they wanted a cheap, but good, pocket watch. He sold the entire case in less than two days and at a handsome profit. That started it all. He ordered more watches from the watch company and encouraged the telegraph operators to set up a display case in the station offering high quality watches for a cheap price to all the travelers. It worked!

It didn't take long for the word to spread and, before long, people other than travelers came to the train station to buy watches. Richard became so busy that he had to hire a professional watch maker to help him with the orders. That was Alvah. And the rest is history as they say. The business took off and soon expanded too many other lines of dry goods. Richard and Alvah left the train station and moved their company to Chicago -- and it's still there.

YES, IT'S A LITTLE KNOWN FACT that for a



while in the 1880's, the biggest watch retailer in the country was at the train station. It all started with a telegraph operator: Richard Sears and his partner Alvah Roebuck!

Bet You Didn't Know That!!! Now that's History!!!!!
